From the Editors' Desk:


Greetings Troopers and Friends.

William "Bill" Morehouse Oldest Member of the Moses Williams Chapter

Willie Morehouse was born on September 4th, 1922 in Elaine, Arkansas. From an early age, Morehouse dedicated his life to serving his community. From construction and military service to feeding the homeless and donating seeing-eye glasses to the underprivileged in Mexico, Morehouse rarely stays still for too long. Today at 91 years old, Morehouse says he doesn't plan on stopping anytime soon.

Morehouse's pattern of hard work, like many in the Silent Generation, began with his hardnosed childhood. Morehouse lost his mother at age 7 and his father was a logger. He had one sibling. Today, Morehouse says that he was raised to always have a job and to never have any less than \$5.00 in his pockets. Although his family and surrounding community groomed him to become a farmer (even sending him to farming school at age 10), Morehouse was determined to go another route.

At the age of 14, after hitchhiking some 350 miles from his hometown to Paris, Texas, he found a full-time job as a logging truck driver. Morehouse eventually moved onto driving trucks for a construction company when he was 16 years old. Along with the company, Morehouse helped build Maxi Army base in Paris, Texas, as well as other military installations in Texas.

Not long after building the bases, Morehouse developed an interest in becoming a United States soldier. At the age 17, he enlisted under the false pretense that he was already 18 years old. In the military, Morehouse served a range of jobs from being a truck driver, to serving in WWII, to a POW guard at the Fort Vancouver barracks in Washington State.

After 3 years in the military, Morehouse left the Pacific Northwest to visit Texas. Four months later, he returned to Vancouver, Wash., to marry a woman, Eula Slider, he had become fond of prior to leaving the barracks. The two decided to settle on the west coast and they moved to Portland, Oregon, to be closer to Slider's family. He and Eula Slider would remain husband and wife until Slider's death in 1994. The couple had only one child, Betty Cabin, who currently lives in West Lynn, Oregon. Morehouse translated his construction and military skills into his road and sewer work for the City of Portland which began in 1954. However, working for the City wasn't enough for Morehouse so he enlisted in the National Guard in 1959, where he would stay for another nine years of military service. While there, Morehouse trained in being a driver, working in medics, and working with signal corp -- which deals with organizing and developing communications-- at Fort Lewis near Tacoma, Washington.

Around the same time, Morehouse became involved with the first of many volunteer organizations. The Lion's Club, which is based out of Portland, fundraises to annually donate eye-glasses and send doctors and nurses to Mexico. Also, around Christmas, the Lion's Club takes underprivileged children, who wouldn't otherwise receive gifts during the holiday, to stores around Portland and allows them to pick out new shoes and clothes. He also works with a number of other volunteer organizations including the American Legion, which buys clothes and food for any military veterans in need, CMAX which fundraises to send 35 nurses to an area of need, and the 40 et 8 which also aids any veterans in need.

The volunteer group that Morehouse has invested himself in the most is the Moses Williams Pacific Northwest Chapter of the Buffalo Soldiers. He first joined in 1989 and was quickly appointed to the position of treasurer. At the time, there were around 67 members; however, that number took a sharp dip around 2000 -- leaving only Morehouse and two other men in the group. In 2000, Morehouse assumed the position of president and took it upon himself to revitalize the organization. For 12 years, Morehouse conducted various Buffalo Soldiers outreach events such as toy drive with horseback delivery of the toys to underprivileged children, food drives, educational presentations, provide Honor Guard at various military ceremonies, including holiday parades.

Today, Morehouse serves as the oldest member of the Moses Williams Chapter both in age and in time spent with the Buffalo Soldiers. On top of volunteering, Morehouse spends time with his child, grandchild, and great-grandchildren. Three times a week, Morehouse works out for 2.5 hours at the gym to keep himself healthy. Although Morehouse is no longer the President, he is still a major part of the Chapter. In the future, Morehouse hopes to see it through that a Buffalo Soldier museum is established at the Historical Vancouver Barracks. In whatever he does, Morehouse hopes to uphold the Buffalo Solider way -- being a man of his word and of example.

Commemorative Ride and Ceremony

On July 23, 2016 Buffalo Soldier, living historians will gather from across the United States at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas for a commemorative ceremony honoring the 1866 formation of the Buffalo Soldier units of the United States Army. This ceremony will mark the beginning of a national, week-long, Sesquicentennial Observance; honoring the African-American cavalry and infantry regiments that became the first black military formations in the standing “peacetime” regular Army of the United States. These black enlisted men and their white officer corps became legendary in their military exploits in the frontier west, the Spanish American War, and the wars and conflicts that followed.

On the 150th anniversary of their formation; two, separate, mounted patrols will depart from New Orleans, Louisiana and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, which were mustering points for the Ninth Cavalry and the Tenth Cavalry, to embark on an historic and symbolic ride to Houston Texas. Mounted riders and equestrian units along the way will join the patrols along their line of march, which will culminate in a military encampment and a parade into Houston, Texas. The encampment will showcase the lives of the frontier soldiers, in the field. The parade will be a salute to the National 9th and 10th Horse Cavalry Association, which will inaugurate their national headquarters and Buffalo Soldier Museum in Houston Texas on July 30, 2016.

During the period July 23- 30, 2016, Buffalo Soldier-enactors and historians, around the country, will hold historical ceremonies and events marking the sesquicentennial of these legendary military units, in their local jurisdictions.

Most historians and the general public are unaware of the amazing exploits of these men, many of whom were veterans of the Union Army during the American civil War. This Sesquicentennial Observance will not only educate the general public but it will introduce dynamic programs aimed at young people that will continue to provide a stronger sense of African American contributions to American military history and a tremendous sense of honor and pride.

We welcome your participation in the planning and execution of this logistically challenging undertaking and we look forward to your active participation. 

Gloriousa Vineyard - I received a call from an old friend Mountain Man, a gentle wildly bearded guy, who reminds of Daniel Boone in some ways. He said that his friend has a vineyard near Pine Valley and has named his new wine after the "Buffalo Soldiers". After speaking with the vineyard owner Mert, several chapter members travelled to Campo to meet Mert and Gloria Thomas. Unfortunately, Gloria was away on business trip, but Mert, a kindhearted gentleman showed us around the Gloriousa Vineyard named for his wife Gloria. The first building was a small clay chapel with two small stained glass windows with one on each side of the door. Inside was just enough room for a vintage 1800 organ and one church pew.

This vineyard is a family owned business located a mile from the U.S. - Mexico border, sitting high in the hills of Campo. This is also the last US Army post of the Buffalo Soldiers, unfortunately all that remains are the dilapidated barracks. The vineyard has no electricity, but is powered by solar panels. Gloriousa grapes are grown on sulfite-free



wines. Tours at the vineyard includes tasting of their prized wines which use organic methods and are sold in Albertsons and Windmill Farms stores. Mert is retired from the Forest Service and Gloria is a retired Antique Collector; a flattering duo. Together they have a beautifully renovated washhouse that was once used at Camp Pendleton, now transformed into living quarters for two. Inside the cottage you will find, a full kitchen, a nicely arranged living room with vintage furniture, a grandfather clock in the corner, pictures displayed on the walls of new and old times, and clay tile floor throughout. There's even a cast iron wood burning stove in the corner and the room flows right into the bedroom, where a water basin sits on the antique dresser. The bathroom has a rustic look with a sunken bathtub where you can watch Merts' tomato plants growing outside the bay window. We finally got to see their new wine, and were amazed to see one of our Troopers featured on the front label, in a reenactment uniform, black stetson hat with the 10th cross saber and wool jacket and scarf. Mert admits he doesn't know who the gentleman is, but would like to find out. The wine is a full bodied Zinfandel from buxom grapes; it's deep, rich color and complex bouquet.

After a few calls and emails, I found out the picture is that of Trooper Earl Crutchfield of the Woods and Wanton Chapter. We purchased a "Soldier" wine, the San Diego stop by for a glass with me. Gloriousa Vineyard.
